**SCWK-3813. Native Cultural Identity and Cultural Survival (NATI)**

Course description: This course explores the historical and contemporary experiences of Indigenous peoples in Canada, with a focus on the impact of colonialism and the role of the state in the process of cultural assimilation. The course examines the ways in which Indigenous peoples have resisted and adapted to these forces, and the importance of cultural identity and survival in the contemporary context. Prerequisites: NATI 1006, SOCI 1006.

**SCWK-3843. Suicide and Indigenous Peoples (NATI)**

Course description: This course explores the complex and multifaceted issue of suicide among Indigenous peoples in Canada. It examines the historical and contemporary factors that contribute to the high rates of suicide, including the legacy of residential schools, the loss of cultural identity, and the impact of social and economic marginalization. The course also explores the role of community, family, and traditional healing practices in the prevention and treatment of suicide. Prerequisites: NATI 1006, SOCI 1006.

**SCWK-3853. Alcohol, Drugs, and Indigenous Peoples (NATI)**

Course description: This course explores the complex and multifaceted issue of alcohol and drug use among Indigenous peoples in Canada. It examines the historical and contemporary factors that contribute to the high rates of substance use, including the legacy of residential schools, the loss of cultural identity, and the impact of social and economic marginalization. The course also explores the role of community, family, and traditional healing practices in the prevention and treatment of substance use. Prerequisites: NATI 1006, SOCI 1006.

**SCWK-3973. Introduction to Narrative and Narrative Analysis (SOC1, GERO, PSYC, ENGL)**

Course description: This course introduces students to the theory and practice of narrative and narrative analysis. It explores the ways in which individuals and communities use narrative to make sense of their experiences and to construct their identities. The course examines the role of narrative in social and cultural change, and the importance of narrative analysis in the study of human experience. Prerequisites: SOC1, GERO, PSYC, ENGL.

**SCWK-5006. Preparation for Professional Social Work Practice (F)**

Course description: This course prepares students for professional social work practice. It focuses on the development of professional skills, including assessment, intervention, and evaluation. The course also explores the ethical and legal aspects of social work practice, and the role of the social worker in the community. Prerequisites: SCWK-3813, SCWK-3843, SCWK-3853, SCWK-3973.

**SCWK-5012. Field Instruction III (K)**

This course is a field instruction for students who have completed SCWK-5010 and SCWK-5011. Students will be placed in a field setting for a minimum of 12 weeks. The course is worth 3 credit hours. Prerequisites: SCWK-5010 and SCWK-5011. Fee: \$700.00. N :T

**SCWK-5013. Group Work Theory and Design (F)**

This course is a field instruction for students who have completed SCWK-5010 and SCWK-5011. Students will be placed in a field setting for a minimum of 12 weeks. The course is worth 3 credit hours. Prerequisites: SCWK-5010 and SCWK-5011. Fee: \$700.00. N :T

**SCWK-5023. The Profession of Social Work in Context (F) (K)**

This course is a field instruction for students who have completed SCWK-5010 and SCWK-5011. Students will be placed in a field setting for a minimum of 12 weeks. The course is worth 3 credit hours. Prerequisites: SCWK-5010 and SCWK-5011. Fee: \$700.00. N :T

**SCWK-5036. Theory of Social Work Practice I (F) (K)**

This course is a field instruction for students who have completed SCWK-5010 and SCWK-5011. Students will be placed in a field setting for a minimum of 12 weeks. The course is worth 3 credit hours. Prerequisites: SCWK-5010 and SCWK-5011. Fee: \$700.00. N :T



**SCWK-5513. Social Work, Organizations and Native People (K)**

This course provides a comprehensive overview of the social work profession, its history, and its role in society. It explores the relationship between social work and various social organizations, including government agencies, non-profit organizations, and community-based organizations. The course also examines the unique challenges and opportunities of working with Native American populations, focusing on cultural differences, historical trauma, and the impact of colonization. Students will learn about the role of social workers in advocating for the rights and well-being of Native American communities.

**SCWK-5713. Introduction to Research Methods and Statistics in Social Work (Indigenous Focus) (F) (K)**

This course introduces students to the fundamental concepts and methods of research in social work, with a specific focus on Indigenous research. It covers the scientific process, including problem identification, literature review, research design, data collection, and analysis. The course emphasizes the importance of cultural sensitivity and ethical considerations in research, particularly when working with Indigenous communities. Students will learn about various research methods, including qualitative, quantitative, and mixed methods, and how to apply these methods to social work practice. The course also covers basic statistical concepts and how to interpret research findings.

**SCWK-5723. Child Welfare (F) (Elective)**

This course provides a detailed examination of the child welfare system, including the roles and responsibilities of various professionals involved in child protection. It explores the historical and cultural context of child welfare, as well as the current challenges and trends in the field. The course covers topics such as child abuse and neglect, foster care, adoption, and the rights of children. Students will learn about the legal and ethical aspects of child welfare and how to work effectively with children and families in need. The course also emphasizes the importance of cultural competence and trauma-informed care in child welfare practice.

**SCWK-5733. Social Work and Aging (F) (Elective)**

The course covers topics such as aging in place, dementia care, and the impact of social isolation on older adults. **SCWK-5763. Spirituality and Social Work (K)**
