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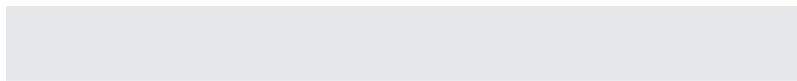
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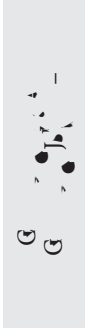
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CRIM-2943. Victimology

Victimology is the study of victims of crime, including the nature and extent of victimization, the impact of crime on victims, and the role of the criminal justice system in addressing victimization. This course explores the theoretical and empirical research in victimology, as well as the practical implications for policy and practice. Topics include: the history of victimology, the victimization process, the impact of crime on victims, the role of the criminal justice system, and the role of victim advocates.

CRIM-3003. Special Topics in Criminology and Criminal Justice (HMRT)

This course provides an in-depth exploration of a specific topic in criminology and criminal justice. The topic is selected from a list of current issues and is designed to provide students with a comprehensive understanding of the topic. Topics may include: the impact of technology on crime, the role of the media in crime, the impact of globalization on crime, and the role of the criminal justice system in addressing global crime.

CRIM-3013. Contemporary Criminological Theory

This course explores the major theories of crime and delinquency, including biological, psychological, and sociological theories. It examines the strengths and weaknesses of each theory and the empirical evidence that supports or refutes them. Topics include: the biological basis of crime, the psychological basis of crime, and the sociological basis of crime.

CRIM-3103. Advanced Qualitative Research Methods

This course provides an in-depth exploration of advanced qualitative research methods, including grounded theory, case study, and narrative research. It examines the strengths and weaknesses of each method and the empirical evidence that supports or refutes them. Topics include: the history of qualitative research, the role of qualitative research in criminology and criminal justice, and the role of qualitative research in policy and practice.

CRIM-3123. Contemporary Issues in Criminal Justice

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CRIM-3643. Terrorism: An Introduction

● This course provides an overview of terrorism, its history, and its impact on society. It covers the definition of terrorism, the motives of terrorists, and the various forms of terrorism, including domestic terrorism, international terrorism, and cyberterrorism. CRIM 3703: Toxic In/Justice: Green Criminology and Environmental Protest (ENVS)

CRIM-3933 or CRIM-3936. Independent Study in Criminology

● This course allows students to pursue independent study in criminology. It provides an opportunity for students to explore a specific area of interest in criminology and to conduct research and write a paper on that topic.

CRIM-4233. Policing, Security, and Governance

This course explores the complex relationship between law, order, and power in contemporary society. It examines the role of police, security agencies, and the state in maintaining social order and protecting citizens. Topics include surveillance, counter-terrorism, and the impact of globalization on security. The course also addresses the challenges of crime prevention and the role of the judiciary in a democratic society.

CRIM-4273. Advanced Studies in Crime in Popular Film

This course delves into the representation of crime in popular culture, with a focus on film. It analyzes how crime is depicted in movies, television series, and documentaries, and how these representations reflect and shape societal attitudes towards crime and justice. Key themes include the criminal as a hero, the media's role in crime reporting, and the influence of crime fiction on real-world law enforcement.

CRIM-4403. Feminist Legal Studies (HMRT) (WSGS)

This course examines the intersection of law and gender, drawing on feminist legal theory to critique traditional legal concepts and practices. It explores issues such as domestic violence, sexual harassment, and the legal status of women. The course also discusses the role of the legal system in perpetuating gender inequality and the potential for legal reform to advance gender justice.

CRIM-4423. Power and Control in Society

This course investigates the dynamics of power and control within society, focusing on the criminal justice system and broader social structures. It examines how power is exercised by various actors, including the state, corporations, and social movements, and how these power relations influence the distribution of resources and the experience of crime.

CRIM-4513. Ethnography and Crime

This course introduces students to the methodology of ethnography and its application in the study of crime. It explores how researchers can use participant observation and in-depth interviews to gain a nuanced understanding of the lived experiences of individuals involved in the criminal justice system, such as police officers, judges, and prisoners.

CRIM-4906. Honours Research Thesis

This course is a capstone experience for students completing their honours program. It involves the development and execution of an independent research project on a topic of interest within the field of criminology. Students are supported by their supervisors throughout the process, from proposal writing to the final thesis submission.
